#### CYF to Eastern Shore

The CYF group will take two mission trips this coming summer. The first trip, June 21-29, will be to the Onacock, VA – on the eastern shore of Virginia. Yes, a long way from Columbia MO, the team of 10 is ready for the drive and the work that awaits in that very different land between water. Working for the second year with *YouthWorks*, a youth mission company, the team will be engaged in several types of service. *YouthWorks* has been serving on the Eastern Shore since 2003, housing at the same church in Onancock the entire time, and in partnership with longstanding friendships in the community.

The Eastern Shore of Virginia, and the town of Onancock in particular, offers a historic setting, serene lifestyle and abundant outdoor recreation. On the Delmarva Peninsula of the Chesapeake Bay, fishing and birdwatching are popular pastimes for both residents and visitors. The economy is largely agricultural, dominated by cotton, soybean and vegetable farms and large-scale chicken farms. Farm and factory jobs have drawn a large number of Hispanic immigrants to this area, bringing a unique cultural influence and dynamic. However, some local residents experience the common rural struggle of unemployment. Another challenge has come from a large number of retirees moving to this beautiful area, causing home prices to increase and diminishing affordable housing options for those with lower incomes.

As a YouthWorks Beyond site, Eastern Shore has a focus on Latino Immigration. High school students are invited to grapple with the complex social and economic issue of immigration. Alongside serving through Work Projects and Kids Club, they are given added emphasis to the idea that listening carefully can also be a form of service to the community. In addition to experiencing the beauty of the Shore, students may serve in a local food bank, visit with nursing home residents, spend time with adults who have disabilities, or serve Latino children through Kids Club. They will also hear from members of the local Latino community about how immigration reforms alter day-to-day life for many. As they listen and learn, know that students may reach questions without clear answers, but we hope, in the process, they more deeply understand the complex issue of immigration and how it affects individuals. This process of understanding will help them continue to wrestle with this issue and find ways of applying what they learn back home in their own community.

In order to ensure all the CYF get a chance to serve this summer a second shorter mission trip experience is being created for high school students for July 20-22. This opportunity will be closer to home, in Missouri, centered around food need projects.

The Chi-Rho Mission Trip is scheduled for June 15-17. The middle school group will be in St. Louis for two days in several inner city serving environments. Assisting the elderly in nursing care facilities, cleaning projects, and food distribution are their primary goals.
